Lesson 2 Recap -

Resisting temptation and sin is 'work' because it involves 'things we do.' Works cannot and never have "saved" anyone according to all scriptures, Old and New Testament. The Lord was tempted by Satan directly while in the wilderness. He addressed each temptation with the Word-the very thing we should be learning in Church. Temptation #1 was absurd because Satan wanted Jesus to turn a stone into "Himself," for He is the Bread of Life [John 6:35]. Temptation #2 was staged in or on a temple because "Judgment begins at the house of God." [1Peter 4:17] Many ministers, churches and denominations are "testing" God today with their theology and teachings. Jesus warns against these practices. Temptation #3 was more absurd than the previous, as Satan offered Jesus something He already owned and created. Jesus is King of kings and Lord of lords. The enemy often offers us false choices and things only temporarily in his possession. We should approach sin and temptations in the same manner as the Lord and call out the devil and absurdity in every circumstance.
